

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

EYRE TELEGRAPH REPEATER STATION (1877) BROUGHT BACK TO LIFE (2005)

Barrie's dream becomes a reality

Eyre Telegraph Repeater Station served Western Australians for fifty years until the original line closed in 1927 to be replaced by a telegraph route along the Trans Australian railway 150 kilometres to the north.

The recent installation of morse telegraph equipment by Morsecodian members will be a permanent reminder to visitors how communication by morse-code opened up the country.

It's been 78 years since telegraph equipment was in use at Eyre, originally known as Eyre's Sand Patch.


was assembled and largely engineered by the Fraternity's technical guru:

The former Eyre telegraph station 50 kilometres south of Cocklebidy, now in the control of CALM but leased to Birds Australia as a bird observatory, regained some of its former glory on 9th May 2005 when members of the Morsecodians Fraternity of Western Australia (Inc.) travelled there to install morse code telegraph equipment for visitor information and interactive display.

Barrie Field—the driving force behind this project along with 6 other telegraphists who made the trip to Eyre, celebrated the return of telegraphy to Eyre by having a dial-up circuit on the day with Fraternity members back in Perth GPO exchanging greeting telegraph messages for the first time for 78 years.

Traffic = Perth to Eyre 11 messages - Eyre to Perth 17 messages.

 Traffic was worked through to Darwin, Adelaide, Melbourne, Beechworth, Sydney, St. Helens/Tasmania, Armadale WA, Yass and Canberra.

Ken remarked that the signs supplied were excellent in advising the public where a particular circuit was working to. Maybe something to consider for W.A. events in the future.

Telegrams under the pavement.
 Installation of the CTO-WAN pneumatic tube referred to in the last edition of the Messenger commenced on the 1st August 1938 and took about 1 month to complete.
 It travelled via Forrest Place, Murray Street, William Street and St. Georges Terrace.
 The brass tube was encased in concrete piping and was buried to a depth of two feet. It ensured that press telegrams were received at the West Australian within ninety seconds of receipt at the CTO.

News from the East:

- May 22nd : Castlemaine Telegraph Station (opened 1.1.1857) will be open for one day during Heritage Week in that town—complete with dial-up facilities.
- June 12th: Moama Telegraph Station (opened 1858) will be open for one day during the long weekend on the occasion of a Cobb & Co coach leaving the station bound for Wilcannia (along the long paddock as the road was known). Being a long weekend with the Rotary Steam Rally in adjoining Echuca there will be a big crowd in the area. The N.S.W. Road Traffic Authority has sponsored this event, and on finding out that the telegraph station will be fully operative—with dial-up on line provided by Telstra—they have asked if they can make the telegraph operation a feature of the day.
- July 1/2/3: At Glenrowan, a **BIG** weekend on the 125th anniversary of Ned Kelly’s capture at that town. Telstra sponsorship has been sought. The telegraph station will be operative in either the former police station/residence or the railway station. The organising committee were absolutely thrilled when the offer of a telegraph station operating was made to them. Dial-up will operate here too with visitors being able to lodge national/international messages. Commemorative forms are being designed.
- August ?: Unknown date as yet—the station at Cape Otway Light Station is to be operative—presumably with dial-up again. We had two Telstra dial-up lines at the opening last year.

Beechworth continues to be busy. I have taken 600 messages from them this year, and I am only one of the many receiving stations they use. thanks Peter Shaw for this news.

“A race to the wire as old hand at Morse code beats txt msgrs”

DOTTY and old-fashioned means of communication can still be the best: Morse code has seen off the challenge of the text message in a contest pitting the best in 19th-century technology against its 21st-century successor. The race to transmit a simple message, staged by an Australian museum, was won — at a dash — by a 93-year-old telegraph operator who tapped it out using the simple system which was devised by Samuel Morse in 1832 and was the mainstay of maritime communication up until 1997. Gordon Hill, who learnt to use the technique in 1927 when he joined the Australian Post Office, easily defeated his 13-year-old rival, Brittany Devlin, who was armed with a mobile phone and a rich vocabulary of text message shorthand. Mr Hill, whose messages were transcribed by another telegraph veteran, Jack Gibson, 82, then repeated the feat against three other children and teenagers with mobile phones. In the competition, at the Powerhouse Museum in Sydney, Mr Hill and his rivals were asked to transmit a line selected at random from an advertisement in a teenage magazine. It read: **“Hey, girlfriend, you can text all your best pals to tell them where you are going and what you are wearing.”** While the telegraphist tapped out the line **in full**, to be deciphered by Mr Gibson, Miss Devlin employed text slang to save time. She keyed: **“hey gf u can txt ur best pals 2 tel them wot u r doing, where ur going and wot u r wearing.”** Just 90 seconds after Mr Hill began transmitting, Mr Gibson announced that he had the message received and written down correctly. It took another 18 seconds for Miss Devlin’s message to reach the mobile phone belonging to her friend. Mr Hill said that he was impressed by modern technology, even though his clunky telegraph machine emerged on top in three further contests. Text messaging, he said, had even been predicted by one of his colleagues in 1961. “An engineer told me the day would come when we would be able to send messages without wires,” he said. Miss Devlin said that she had two years of texting experience. “I send about three messages a day,” she said. “I used to send lots more but I ran out of credit.” “The TimesOnline newspaper” 16th April 2005 by Mark Henderson
